


Uncover Sustainability Sights at Resorts World Sentosa

Welcome to Resorts World Sentosa, a world-class integrated resort by Genting Singapore that is also the 1st in the world to be certified a sustainable tourism destination and hotels by the Global Sustainable Tourism Council.

1 Equarius Hotel



• First WELL (Gold) certified hotel in Singapore

Your walking tour starts at Equarius Hotel, the first WELL (Gold) certified hotel in Singapore. Certifications are essential to our sustainability journey as an important third-party validation of our efforts. These international benchmarks also provide us more insights into improving our sustainability efforts.

The WELL certification is an international standard for occupant well-being, comprising 10 different facets like air quality and nourishment. Features to enhance well-being are integrated through the hotel – from the large fan above improving air circulation, to the healthy and fresh food options provided.

Take a detour towards Tangerine for your next stop.

2 Herb Garden & Eco-pond



- Over 50 edible plants and herbs harvested weekly for our restaurants from our herb garden
- Eco-pond designated as a biodiversity reserve for wetland species

Our herb garden supplies over 50 edible plants and herbs to our specialty restaurants. Our F&B team works closely with our Landscaping team, identifying seasonal plants they can use and harvesting them on a weekly basis, such as wild pepper leaves and the blue pea flower.

Our Eco-pond is accessible behind the Herb Garden and Tangerine. The Eco-pond is one of the six water catchment areas in the resort, designated as a biodiversity reserve while the other 5 serve as rainwater catchment, which are then used for irrigation.

Head back to the lobby of Equarius Hotel, and walk up the pavement along the forest.

3 Coastal Forest



- Preserved 2.9 hectare coastal forest
- 93 plant species, two heritage trees,
 21 butterfly and 17 bird species recorded
 through biodiversity surveys

The 2.9 hectare coastal forest has been preserved since the resort's inception, with extensive planning done to minimise disruption to the biodiversity land-scape as the resort was being constructed.

Over the years, surveys studying the biodiversity in the area have recorded about 93 plant species (including two nationally designated heritage trees), 21 butterfly species and 17 bird species, and one-third of the species are considered vulnerable, making the forest a thriving biodiversity home.

Pass by TreeTop Lofts before crossing the road to reach the Resorts World Convention Centre drop-off point.

4 Resorts World Convention Centre



- Ist in the world to be certified Platinum against Events Industry Council 2022 Sustainable Events Standards (Venue)
- Minimise waste-to-landfill through recycling 10 waste streams and minimising single-use plastics in the resort

Events can have a significant carbon footprint – from waste generated from buffet waste and printed materials, to using significant electricity and water. To mitigate the environmental impact of events, our Team Members are trained to support the varying sustainability needs of event clients. We have also ensured event spaces are installed with energy efficient LED lighting, and toilets are fitted with water efficient taps to be as resource efficient as possible.

We have also committed to several national-level pledges to minimise single-use waste, and our resort recycles 10 different waste streams. With all these efforts, we are the first venue in the world to be certified Platinum against the 2022 Sustainable Venue standards by Events Industry Council (EIC).

From the drop-off point, turn right and head into Hotel Ora.

5 Hotel Ora



- Certified BCA Green Mark Platinum (Super Low Energy)
- Used green construction materials as labelled by Singapore Green Building Council; and repurposing original fixtures to reduce construction waste
- Supporting local through F&B offerings, and featured retail goods by social enterprises

Employing sustainable building design is imperative to us. This is reflected in Hotel Ora, where we intentionally retained the old Festive Hotel structure, reused materials such as timber trellis structures from the Festive Hotel swimming pool for ceiling décor, selected materials certified sustainable by the Singapore Green Building Council and retrofitted hybrid cooling for all hotel rooms. Our efforts led us to be awarded the BCA Green Mark Platinum (Super Low Energy) accolade.

As part of our corporate social responsibility efforts, we also provide a pro bono shelf located by the hotel entrance to retail social enterprise items, with all proceeds directed to beneficiaries. Snacks from local brands and social enterprises are also featured at our F&B corner.

Walk through the Galleria to the end till you see the Adam & Eve sculpture. Exit towards Ave8.

6 Ave8



- Supporting local with 90% of all spend on local vendors
- Highest Tier for Singapore Food Agency's Farm-to-Table Recognition Programme
- ETFE canopy overhead increases thermal comfort for visitors

Ave8 is home to the resort's varied specialty restaurants, and our chefs incorporate locally sourced produce in all their menus. Today, nearly 90% of the resort's total spend is on homegrown vendors, and that includes almost all our eggs and more than half of our leafy vegetables that you see in our restaurants, netting us the Highest Tier under Singapore Food Agency's Farm-to-Table Recognition Programme to recognise companies supporting local farms.

As we walk through Ave8, look up towards the roofs. We have deployed ETFE (Ethylene tetrafluoroethylene) material for the roof that blocks off about 70% of heat from the sun, keeping our premise cool and improving the thermal comfort of our visitors.

Take the escalators or stairs down and walk straight towards the bustling Gourmet Park.

7 Gourmet Park



- Vendors promoting good causes such as coffee with proceeds going to refugees, and 'meatless' burgers to promote a meat-free diet
- Green wall of plants contributed by over 900 RWS staff during Earth Day

The bustling Gourmet Park is a food truck court hosting everything from elevated street food to local favourites. Our food vendors have collectively committed to minimise single-use plastics, and

some vendors feature their own 'green' messages, such as 'meatless' burgers and coffee with proceeds supporting refugees.

Behind Gourmet Park is a 'green wall', featuring small shrubs and plants that were potted and contributed by our own staff during Earth Day. Sustainability is never done in silos, but always in partnership with stakeholders from our team members to our tenants.

Exit Gourmet Park and reach the final tour stop at the Universal Studios entrance.

8 USS Entrance



- Over 2,000 solar panels located across all available rooftops in Universal Studios Singapore, taking up 6,900m²
- Anticipated Minion Land at Universal Studios Singapore to be first attraction in the world to be carbon neutral

Our attractions also hold several key sustainability initiatives – for example at Universal Studios Singapore, over 2,000 solar panels are fitted on top of all available rooftops, and the lagoon which is a rainwater catchment area for irrigation needs. Beneath the ground, pipes from our energy-efficient District Cooling Plant (DCP) pipes help meet our cooling needs – we are the only hospitality in Singapore that owns and operates our own DCP.

At Universal Studios Singapore, we will soon welcome Singapore's first zero-energy attraction, Minion Land, which will be powered by renewable energy.

Our never-ending journey

While your walk ends here, the sustainability journey keeps going! As we pledge to decarbonise our operations by 30% by 2030, keep your eyes peeled for us as we continue our journey towards being a global leader in sustainable tourism. Here are some other areas of interest tucked away throughout the resort:

- Our Universal Studios Singapore lagoon, which acts as a rainwater catchment
- Our back-of-house central waste collection points situated beneath the resort, segregating and recycling 10 different waste streams
- The award-winning energy efficient District Cooling Plant which keeps up with our cooling needs
- The upcoming RWS 2.0 expansion, with many more features to come!
